Thursday April 4th

Kevin Norris returned to talk about his trek along the Kokoda trail in Papua New Guinea. During World War 2, the Japanese tried to invade Port Moresby on the west coast of Papua, New Guinea with the intention of then invading Australia, only 55 kilometres away. The Japanese succeeded in bombing Darwin carrying out 100 bombing raids but an invasion did not happen.

The terrain of the Kokoda trail rises from 300 feet to 7000 feet and conditions are harsh with extreme humidity, mosquitoes and difficult climbs. During the conflict, 660 Allied troops and 10,000 Japanese died, mainly through disease.

Solo travellers are not allowed to complete the trek and all would-be walkers require permits. Local villagers can earn more money if groups participate. Kevin described the corruption that is prevalent in the country with a poor infrastructure allowing gross misuse of aid from Australia.

There are 800 different tribes speaking different languages, head-hunting tribes and groups of people who have not been 'discovered' by the Western world.

It took Kevin and his group 9 days to complete the trek and they then flew over to the nearby island of East New Britain where there is a smoking volcano which periodically erupts. Kevin illustrated his talk with beautiful photographs of the people and the landscape but ended by saying he was quite ill after the trek, having been bitten by mosquitoes. However, nothing seems to deter him and he mentioned he was planning to swim(!) around some Greek Islands in the summer so watch this space, we want to hear about it!

The next meeting is on **May 2nd at 7.30pm** when Glynis Bevan will talk about 'Long lost family', an emotional story full of joy and hope, of how a son finds his birth mother after 39 years.
